Plan for professional learning

ECA recognises that professional learning is important for educators and teams and that high-value professional learning is inherently linked to quality outcomes for children. ECA provides a range of professional learning opportunities to help meet the needs of educators and teachers with diverse skill sets working in a variety of different settings. ECA courses take anywhere from hours to weeks and months to complete and can be undertaken individually or alongside peers to allow for learning to be contextualised and embedded.

Early childhood professionals are inundated with competing demands and are looking for the most effective ways to engage in ongoing professional development. Planning for professional learning and networking opportunities is critical as part of ongoing professional growth and quality improvement.



As you consider these resources, we encourage you to plan for and prioritise and develop professional learning plans for yourself and your teams.

Tip 1 Develop a professional learning plan with clear goals aligned with priorities

To be intentional about professional learning, it is important to have a clear plan outlining its implementation. This plan needs to link to your personal, room or service goals for professional learning, encompassing priorities across:

- onboarding new employees with induction and orientation training
- · compliance training on topics such as mandatory reporting and workplace health and safety
- individual professional learning activities that contribute towards teacher registration and individual performance appraisal goals
- team or service development, which may be based on Quality Improvement Plan or commitments made in a Reconciliation Action Plan
- management and leadership development to ensure you are developing future leaders in your team and staying up to date with good management practices.

Tip 2 Engage staff in decision-making about their own learning to build ownership

When developing your professional learning plan, you might consult with your team on how they think decisions should be made. Some services and organisations give employees an annual budget or an allocation of paid time to spend on approved training; others take a team-based approach with agreement on shared learning areas. There is no 'right way', and your approach might change over time, but shared understanding and team input will help to build enthusiasm for professional learning, enhance ownership and engagement, and flow through to practice.

Once your plan and budget are set, ensure everyone understands how decisions will be made about team/group learning and individual opportunities. To aid their understanding, you could provide team members with a summary of the professional learning plan and specifically address frequently asked questions such as:

- can an individual ask to do a course or attend an event?
- will everyone have access to the same publications or online learning?
- who will approve or manage the process of paying for a course or an event?
- what are the expectations about reporting back?

Tip 3 Allocate a realistic budget to achieve the goals you have set

As a general guide, ECA recommends that organisations allocate between 1% (minimum) and 2% (good practice) of the annual expenditure on wages/salaries to professional learning.

Another way to develop a budget is to identify the professional learning activities you would like everyone to do, then calculate the cost of the training, participation (e.g. time and travel) and backfill.

Look out for opportunities to augment your professional learning budget by applying for training grants/subsidies, event scholarships, or sponsored places—and don't forget to maximise membership discounts you are eligible for.

Tip 4 Offer a variety of learning opportunities using multiple forms and approaches

People learn in different ways, individuals may be at different starting points, and changing practice can be difficult to achieve. So whether your aim is to build consistency across your team or to support individuals to flourish in specialised areas, offering a variety of professional learning opportunities will always be beneficial.

- Professional reading can be supported by dedicated paid time and access to a library or journal/book series.
 E-books, audio books and podcasts are also important sources for sharing new ideas, exploring controversies and staying up to date.
- Professional conversations can be incorporated into regular team meetings and supervision. You might also establish communities of practice or learning circles within your service and/or participate in professional networks and events that foster dialogue.
- Inquiry-based learning can be supported by collaborative projects and opportunities to present to the team or lead a professional conversation.
- Online learning can help build common or shared knowledge across a team, particularly when combined with professional reading and conversations.
- Courses and programs enable individuals to build their skills in areas of interest or need. They can be individual and self-paced or in a group learning setting.
- Conferences and events give individuals the opportunity to be immersed in professional learning and build a network beyond their workplace.
- Mentoring and coaching are particularly good for leadership development or specialist learning.
- Cultural immersion experiences, led by Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander people on Country, can provide a depth of understanding.
- Bringing in an expert or consultant to work with the whole team on a shared learning goal can build a sense of being on a journey together.
- Study tours that involve visiting other services, centres of excellence or specialist programs to learn about different approaches to pedagogy or programming can be transformative experiences.
- Learning in the flow of work builds on the notion of being a 'learning organisation' where team members are encouraged to learn on a day-to-day basis. Teams that do this well support each other to be curious, talk about their practice, share interesting resources and participate in professional networks.

Tip 5 Evaluate and sustain professional learning to create a culture of continuous improvement

To create a culture of continuous improvement and encouragement, it is important to regularly discuss professional learning and evaluate its impact. Inviting staff members to report back on their professional learning experiences and share what they have learned not only reinforces their learning but also extends the benefits to others.

Keep a record of time and resources invested in learning activities, or provide a regular update on progress against the professional learning plan to your governing body. Staff satisfaction surveys can also be useful for assessing the effectiveness of professional learning.



Encountering and interpreting the principles of Reggio Emilia Encounters (4-part series)

Encounter 1—Not just any place

The first Encounter provides an overview of the educational project of Reggio Emilia and the context, culture and complexity of this educational approach. The next two Encounters will build on this initial information with an indepth exploration of several of the important concepts of the project.

Encounter 2—Seeing things differently

In the second Encounter, 'Seeing things differently', you will be offered information about some of the pedagogical choices made by educators who work in the municipal early childhood centres in Reggio Emilia and Australian interpretations of this approach. Participatory planning: The Floorbooks® Approach and nature pedagogy

Presenter: Dr Claire Warden

These professional learning packages have been developed by Dr Claire Warden in partnership with ECA.

What is the Floorbooks Approach?

The Floorbooks Approach is designed to create a balance between adult intentionality and child autonomy. Floorbooks allow educators to consult deeply with children during the planning and documentation process. The approach encourages higher-order thinking skills and helps children influence their learning.

What are Talking Tubs?

A Talking Tub is a container that a practitioner fills with a wide variety of objects based on a particular theme. Objects can be taken out one by one, encouraging children to touch, feel and explore a theme. Observation, documentation, assessment and planning are most effective when they are matched to the needs of the child. In order to achieve this, we need to understand children's thinking by considering all the ways in which they communicate.

The Talking Tub is a vital part of the Talking and Thinking Floorbooks Approach. The tub will allow you to provoke child-led conversations, which in turn will create possible lines of development.

What is nature pedagogy?

Nature pedagogy is an educational way of working with children that embraces nature. 'Nature pedagogy is an understanding of our sense of belonging to land, our sense of working with nature. There is a pedagogical shift when you move outside into nature ... It's learning with nature, not just teaching about it.'—Dr Claire Warden.






The ECA Leadership Program





- Be consistent so your child knows the boundaries and what to expect.
- Involve your child in setting rules whenever you can.
- Give encouragement when you see positive behaviour, such as helping someone or being kind.
- Give choices: 'Would you like to play your drum outside or do something quiet inside with me?'
- Respond to your child's feelings: 'I know you feel cross, but it is not okay to hit. Let's think about what you could do instead.'


