

Strengthening practice through professional development



By connecting theory with practice, we build knowledge, confidence and a greater sense of purpose, nurturing enthusiasm, growth and excellence both personally and professionally.

ECA recognises the vital role of professional learning in achieving quality outcomes for children. That's why we provide a wide range of opportunities designed to meet the diverse needs of educators and teachers across all settings. Whether undertaken individually or alongside peers, this allows for learning to be contextualised and embedded.

Working with young children and families is complex and demanding. Educators need up-to-date skills, knowledge and strategies to navigate these competing demands with confidence. ECA acknowledges and supports the crucial role of professional development by offering engaging, high-quality professional learning that inspires and empowers teams to thrive and achieve quality outcomes for children.

As you explore these opportunities, we encourage you to prioritise professional learning plans for yourself and your team. Effective professional development works best when it's collaborative, bringing together managers and educators to plan, implement and sustain growth that makes a lasting difference.





Self-assessment of learning—Reflective practice encourages individuals to set personal goals, recognise their strengths and areas for improvement, and take ownership of their professional growth.

When developing individual professional learning plans, consider:

- current knowledge of service-based policies and procedures
- required compliance-based training: mandatory reporting and legal responsibilities, WHS, first aid and safe sleep
- best practice approaches to meet the National Quality Standard
- (for teachers) professional learning that contributes to teacher registration
- team or service development that supports the service's Quality Improvement Plan (QIP) and Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP)
- how the plan supports aspirations as well as areas of growth, future goals and findings of past performance reviews.

Extension over time—Effective professional development is not a one-time event; it is an ongoing process that fosters sustained learning and growth. A strong development plan should include clear, measurable and achievable goals, with steps that define the actions to reach them and tangible indicators of success (how will you know when the goal has been met?).

To build a culture of continuous improvement, make professional learning a regular topic of discussion and actively evaluate its impact. Break the long-term plan into smaller, manageable milestones, and schedule check-ins to review progress, celebrate achievements and adjust strategies as needed.

Professional collaboration and evaluation—Having a mentor, experienced colleague or trusted peer to discuss developing practice is invaluable. These types of professional relationships provide support, constructive feedback and a safe space to explore new ideas. Such collaboration helps navigate challenges, refine approaches and embed learning more effectively.

Mentors also gain from the experience, as guiding others can strengthen their own professional practice and contribute to their ongoing development.

It is equally important to document your professional learning journey. Keep a reflective diary where you record insights, strategies you have implemented and the ways in which new learning has influenced your practice. This kind of documented critical reflection not only supports growth but also serves as strong evidence of Exceeding themes.

Knowledge into practice—Participants should implement strategies learned during training in their daily practice, turning knowledge into meaningful action. Inviting staff members to share their professional learning experiences and insights not only reinforces their own growth but also extends the benefits to colleagues, fostering a culture of collective learning.

Quality improvement is a team commitment—Planning for professional learning and networking opportunities is essential to ongoing growth and quality improvement. In education and care settings, all team members share responsibility for maintaining high standards, with accountability to one another. Building a culture of professional inquiry, critical reflection and continuous improvement requires a collective commitment, one that can only be achieved through a collaborative approach. In education and care, staff development is closely tied to the Quality Improvement Plan (QIP).





Participatory planning: The Floorbooks® Approach and nature pedagogy

Presenter: Dr Claire Warden

These professional learning packages have been developed by Dr Claire Warden in partnership with ECA.

What is the Floorbooks Approach?

The Floorbooks Approach is designed to create a balance between adult intentionality and child autonomy. Floorbooks allow educators to consult deeply with children during the planning and documentation process. The approach encourages higher-order thinking skills and helps children influence their learning.

What are Talking Tubs?

A Talking Tub is a container that a practitioner fills with a wide variety of objects based on a particular theme. Objects can be taken out one by one, encouraging children to touch, feel and explore a theme. Observation, documentation, assessment and planning are most effective when they are matched to the needs of the child. In order to achieve this, we need to understand children's thinking by considering all the ways in which they communicate.

The Talking Tub is a vital part of the Talking and Thinking Floorbooks Approach. The tub will allow you to provoke child-led conversations, which in turn will create possible lines of development.

What is nature pedagogy?

Nature pedagogy is an educational way of working with children that embraces nature. 'Nature pedagogy is an understanding of our sense of belonging to land, our sense of working with nature. There is a pedagogical shift when you move outside into nature ... It's learning with nature, not just teaching about it.'—Dr Claire Warden



Six key topics



Describes the need for a clear and accurate purpose statement along with a well-defined vision that is inclusive of all stakeholders. Explores the concept of values and focuses on the essential elements necessary for successful business planning.

Philosophy, purpose and planning

Financial management systems

Examines the relationship between financial management and the education and care sector. Delves into the responsibilities of managers in areas such as budgeting, reporting and basic tax requirements.



Decision-making and effective communication

Explains the importance of change, its effects and how to facilitate it through effective decision-making. Covers various functional systems, policies and procedures necessary for supporting an evolving business.



Understanding governance and legal frameworks

The ECA Leadership Program

The ECA *Leadership Program* is founded on expert research and sector consultation. It has been designed by some of Australia's foremost early childhood experts, including Sandra Cheeseman, Leanne Gibbs and Manjula Waniganayake, and further quality assured by early childhood leaders. Our *Leadership Program* was specifically created as a strengths-based, self-directed, short-term program for both current and aspiring early childhood leaders in diverse settings.

The ECA Leadership Program was redeveloped in 2021 to incorporate contemporary sector research, and it was reviewed again by educators, leaders and aspiring leaders from across the sector.
